For the 2023 program, Segura has included Carlos Rolón's new series of embroidered, text-based works created atop repurposed blue roof-tarps. These tarps, originally used as temporary roofs in Puerto Rico post-hurricanes, have remained in place for years and draw attention to the US Government's lack of action in Puerto Rico. This new series of work will help fund and activate a social project designed to build permanent Zinc coated roofs for those most in need. Rolón's goal is to remove the memories and threat of compounding devastation for those living under these temporary and unsustainable conditions.

Carlos Rolón (b. 1970) is known for his multi-disciplinary practice that employs craft, ritual, beauty, spirituality, and history to explore the macro narrative of the Caribbean diaspora and the specific experiences of the artist's own childhood spent between the urban landscape of Chicago and his family's native Puerto Rico. His newest text-based works consisting of fabric, embroidery, and mixed media feature flora and fauna with concise words or phrases used by locals on the island that express one's daily emotions.








Rejected Signal IV, 2022 Oil on canvas 66 7/8 x 47 1/4 in 170 x 120 cm Marcos Acosta's (b. 1980) paintings illuminate humanity's intersection with the natural world and evolved out of his upbringing near the Sierras de Córdoba in central Argentina. Marcos' dramatic canyons and jagged mountain tops are interrupted by abstract lines that prominently announce our arrival into these spaces. Although we are a part of nature ourselves, these linear shapes seem to indicate us in a contemporary sense, while his curvilinear forms reveal the natural environment around us.







Rejected Signal II, 2022 Oil on canvas 66 7/8 × 47 1/4 in 170 × 120 cm



Rejected Signal III, 2022 Oil on canvas 66 7/8 x 47 1/4 in 170 x 120 cm




Shout, 2022 Oil on canvas 37 3/8 × 29 7/8 in 95 × 76 cm







Memory of Fire, 2022 Oil on canvas 40 1/8 × 35 3/8 in 102 × 90 cm

















Chasm, 2022 Rock powder pigment and black sand on linen 70 7/8  $\times$  54 3/4 in 180  $\times$  139.1 cm

Rachel Garrard's (b.1984) paintings move between the liminal space of the physical and the esoteric worlds. Her multi-disciplinary practice encompasses painting, sculpture, video, performance, installation, and holographic projection. Garrard incorporates natural elements in her works through pigments and earth materials, establishing a relational dynamic with her natural surroundings.






Enfolded, 2022 Rock powder pigment and black sand on linen 70  $7/8 \times 54$  3/4 in  $180 \times 139.1$  cm

Together, 2021 Rock powder pigment on linen 33 1/2 x 27 1/2 in 85.1 x 69.8 cm Garrard's journey begins with the land. The Earth and its physical elements form the underlying base of her work, whereby the artist creates her pigments ground from the land she revers. These handmade hues are then transferred to canvas in subtle shapes and iconography that both honor the origin of the material while illuminating the spiritual aura found in one's connection to the natural world.




Time Makes Reality Stick, 2022 Oil on canvas  $9.7/8 \times 9.7/8$  in  $25 \times 25$  cm Rebecca Sharp (b. 1976) shrouds such narratives in an unseen world, like her ongoing meditation practice, transforming her adept craftsmanship into the metaphysical realm. These compositions present bold yet delicate visualizations of multiple planes of existence, filled with symbolist imagery and cosmic connotations.






Coherence, 2022 Oil on canvas 9 7/8 x 9 7/8 in 25 x 25 cm



Facing Both Directions, 2023 Oil on canvas 9 7/8 x 9 7/8 in 25 x 25 cm



Friends and Love in Space, 2023 Oil on canvas 9 7/8 x 9 7/8 in 25 x 25 cm Perhaps the most important reoccurring symbol found in Sharp's works is a multicolored pole. For the artist, the pole represents an antenna that connects Earth to the cosmos- the power and pathway to something beyond the human mind. These paintings, as if tiny portals, transform the everyday world and the objects within them so that we may see a place inaccessible without her guidance.
